Recent sightings around the Emm Brook

Do let us know what you see when you are out and about along the Emm Brook. Since January there have been a few excitements 1) a snipe by Meadow Road Bridge, 2) a possible ofter, 3) regular kingfisher sightings. 4) red kites flying over, see page.2. Snipe are very distinctive with a long straight beak, ofters are easily confused with mink, but ofters are slightly bigger than mink and swim with their heads only just showing above the water, mink swim with heads out of the water. Kingfishers are very distinctive bright blue and flying very fast.


NEW FOTEB WEBSITE


RED KITES and Other Birds of Prey around the Emm

RED KITES were reintroduced into the Chilterns about 15 years ago and have since spread to the surrounding regions. They are often seen over Wokingham now and frequently over the area around the Emm Brook. They are very distinctive birds and if you look UP as you walk along the brook you will often see them soaring. A big bird measuring about 62cms long and with a wingspan of 150 - 160 cms. Look for the distinctive outline in the sky, a deeply forked tail with red tail feathers.



OTHER BIRDS OF PREY seen around the EMM

Kestrels: are common, often seen hovering, Length about 34cms,. Reddish back. Male, grey head, black wing



Sparrow Hawks: not so common as kestrels, but regular visitors. Female 38cms, male 28cms
